Social Security Turns 77, What Do You Have to Say About It?

As the presidential election heats up, we're bound to hear a lot from all sides about **Social Security**. AARP's "You've Earned a Say" national tour visited Springfield, Illinois; Billings, Montana; Sedalia, Missouri; Cincinnati, Ohio; and Des Moines, Iowa. The "You've Earned a Say" campaign, launched earlier this year, aims to ensure that the national conversation on Social Security takes into account the voices of as many Americans as possible — not just those who speak the loudest, and not just behind closed congressional doors.
