people who haven't had chickenpox, especially if you have Shingles blisters that have not yet crusted. Your health care professional can tell you about other situations you may need to avoid if you have Shingles.

Vaccines: **ZOSTAVAX®** (Zoster Vaccine Live | Developed By Merck & Company, Inc.)

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) currently recommends a single dose of **ZOSTAVAX** for all appropriate people 60 years of age and older, regardless of whether they have had a prior case of shingles, noting that persons with chronic medical conditions may be vaccinated unless their condition constitutes a contraindication.

If you have Medicare Part D, the optional prescription drug benefit, your shingles vaccine should be covered but the process may be more complicated that filling a prescription for a medication. Your **Part D** plan will pay for the vaccine, and for its administration by your doctor or other health care provider. Before you get a vaccination, you should check with your **Part D** plan to see where you can get your shot at the lowest cost. You typically pay the least for your shingles shot if you are vaccinated at: a pharmacy that is in your drug plan's network; or a doctor's office that can work with a network pharmacy that will bill your Part D plan for the entire cost of the vaccination; or can bill your Part D plan for the vaccine, directly. If you receive the shot from an in-network pharmacy or from a doctor's office that can bill your Part D plan, you should only need to pay the plan's approved copayment at the time you get vaccinated. If you get the shingles vaccine from a doctor's office that can't bill your Part D plan, you will have to pay the cost of the vaccination up front, and then follow your Part D plan's rules to get a refund. You will only be refunded your Part D plan's approved amount for the vaccination. You will be responsible for the difference between the doctor's charge and the plan's approved amount.

**ZOSTAVAX** is also a covered medical benefit for people 60 and older under the **U.S. Veterans Health Administration** and **TRICARE**, the health plan for the U.S. Department of Defense Military Health System.

This month's newsletter is devoted to the Shingles Virus (also called herpes zoster) ... prompted by factors that **DIRECTLY** affect(ed) me. Just last month (yes - July 2014) my mother (Miss Alberta ... recall she visited me/us during our June meeting) came down with a s-e-r-i-o-u-s SHINGLES *"episode"* that - even now - she's still recovering from. Her "episode" along with my older brother's "episode" a few years ago were the catalyst that prompted me to learn more about SHINGLES, get my SHINGLES vaccination and share information about SHINGLES with my/our members/ readership. Note: Some photographs/images/descriptions may be "disturbing." My intent is to **INFORM** not **DISTURB** ... please accept my sincere apologies.

About SHINGLES: The word Shingles comes from the Latin word cingulum, which means girdle or belt. Shingles is caused by the same virus that causes chickenpox. If/after you have chickenpox, the virus that caused it, called *varicella*, remains in your body. It's always inside you, lying dormant (or asleep) in your nerve cells. At some point later in life, your immune system may weaken, allowing the virus to resurface as Shingles. You may be feeling great, but if you've had chickenpox, the Shingles virus is already inside you. And your risk for Shingles increases as you get older.



The Shingles rash usually affects only one of the parts of the body. Most often, the Shingles rash occurs in a band or strip on one side of the body. This band is called a dermatome, which is the area where one of the nerves from your spinal cord connects with the skin. Shingles usually appears along a dermatome, each of which is located on one side of the body. Shingles may also appear on a single side of the face, for example, in the area around the eye and the forehead. But Shingles can strike any dermatome on the body.









The rash isn't always the first sign of Shingles. For some people, the first sign of Shingles may be

a pain, tingling, or an itchy feeling on a specific part of the skin, on a single side of the body. This sensation may last from two to three days. The Shingles rash typically appears on the same part of the skin where the initial symptoms were felt.

Once the rash appears, the pain can become more severe. The Shingles rash may begin as fluidfilled blisters similar to chickenpox blisters. These may be in a band or a cluster, or even be just a few blisters here and there. The pain associated with the Shingles rash can be constant, or it can come and go. Sometimes the pain is so intense that even a slight breeze can cause discomfort. The rash

itself may range from mild to severe.

The number of blisters varies with each case of Shingles. Sometimes the blisters merge, forming a solid red band that looks like a severe burn. In some cases of Shingles, only a few scattered blisters appear. Because the virus that causes Shingles travels through the nerves, the Shingles rash always follows the path of nerve endings. That's why the rash most often appears along a single side of the body and usually does not cross the middle of one's body. The band-like appearance of the rash is what gives Shingles its name.

Usually, Shingles blisters take between 2 to 4 weeks to turn to scabs and heal. However, sometimes the pain of Shingles can linger for months, or even years. For most healthy people, after the Shingles rash heals, the pain and itch subside, and the blisters leave without a trace. But in some cases, even after the rash heals, there can be permanent scarring or changes to the skin pigment. And in some cases, there may be lingering pain that can last for months, or even years. This condition is called **PHN**, or **postherpetic neuralgia**. While antivirals given in the early stages of Shingles can help reduce the risk of developing **PHN**, they cannot cure Shingles. **PHN** symptoms can only be

treated with other prescription medications.

If you have Shingles, here are some things that might help. Your age is not the only thing that puts you at risk for Shingles. Other factors and conditions can weaken your immune system, allowing the painful rash of Shingles to break through your defenses. For example, physical trauma, surgery, and medicines or chronic conditions that suppress your immune system can also increase your

risk for Shingles.

It's not easy to tell if you have Shingles before the actual outbreak of the rash. Many of the symptoms some people feel before the rash (itching, burning, pain) can often resemble other diseases and conditions, including a bad sunburn and/or an allergic reaction. If you think you have Shingles, see your health care professional as soon as you can.

THERE IS NO CURE FOR SHINGLES. The Shingles rash usually lasts up to 30 days. Some treatments may help bring some temporary relief to the pain and itch of the rash. Here are some ways to try to stay as comfortable as possible with Shingles, however, these treatments provide only some relief and may not be effective for everyone.

- oatmeal bath, starch bath, or calamine lotion, may help relieve itching and discomfort.
- infections and damage to the skin that scratching may cause.
- taken to help reduce itching.

Your health care professional may prescribe pain medications or anti-inflammatories to help reduce the pain of the Shingles rash.

Situations to avoid if you have Shingles. You cannot get Shingles from someone who has the disease. However, the virus that causes Shingles is the same virus that causes chickenpox. So, someone who has never had chickenpox could get chickenpox from a person with Shingles if he or she comes into direct contact with the Shingles rash when the blisters have not yet crusted. So it's very important to stay away from newborns, people who have problems with their immune system, and

• Bathing daily and keeping your fingernails clean and trimmed can help prevent bacterial

• Keeping the affected area of skin exposed to the air may help the rash heal more quickly.

 Over-the-counter topical local steroids applied to the skin can provide some relief to patients suffering from the pain or itch that may occur during or after Shingles. Antihistamines can also be
